

Accounts from Mark Baker's Ledger

Baker	Eliza W.	1829 - 32	19	Mark's niece (b. 1805), the daughter of his older brother Daniel (b. 1767).
Baker	Philip	1831 - 34	3	Mark's older brother (b. 1782). Also moved to Sanbornton Bridge, N. H.
Baker	Aaron W.	1834	1	Mark's nephew (b. 1796), the son of his brother James (b. 1765). His son was Henry M. Baker (b. 1841) who later became a state representative and always remained a close friend of Mrs. Eddy.
Bartlett	Rufus G. L.	1843 - 47	3	A tailor (b. ca. 1815). Served with Mark on Park Cemetery Association in 1851. Later served as a representative in the state legislature. Married daughter of John Curry in 1843.
Boynton	William	1833	5	Likely a neighbor in Bow, N. H.
Carlton	John G.	1840 - 41	2	n/a
Chamberlyn	William	1855	1	Likely a chair maker (b. 1790) who lived near Mark in 1850.
Chase	Palmer W.	1830	2	n/a
Chase, Esq	Benjamin	1838	1	Likely the man who sold his woolens mill to Moses Morrill .
Colby	Benjamin	1836 - 43	38	Likely a farmer (b. 1778). His son was Benjamin M. Colby, who served with Mark on the Park Cemetery Association.

Cross	Hazen N.	1844	1	Attended the Congregational church in Tilton, which the Bakers also attended.
Cross & Bartlett		1838 - 43	5	n/a
Curry	John	1837 - 43	30	A farmer (b. 1798). Mark purchased his Sanbornton Bridge farm in 1836. His daughter married R. G. L. Bartlett in 1843. Curry was a trustee of the Tilton secondary school, the New Hampshire Conference Seminary, founded in 1845, where Mrs. Eddy occasionally taught in the early 1850s. He also served in the state legislature.
Cutchins	Moses	1834	2	A close friend of the Baker children for many years. He is referenced in many letters.
Davis	Franklin	1835	6	n/a
Durgin	Elijah	1837 - 49	23	A laborer (b. 1784). He lived next to Mark's property. His nephew Lyman lived with the Bakers for a time. Another young relative, William Jackson Durgin, later married Alexander H. Tilton's widowed daughter-in-law, Abbie Gardner Day.
Farnum	Asa	1833 - 34	3	n/a
Follansby	William	1836 - 37	7	A prominent Sanbornton Bridge resident (b. 1802). Along with Enos Hoyt , helped pay for one-third of the building of the Congregational church in Tilton, which the Bakers attended.

Gale	(Col.) J.	1836 - 42	10	Likely Col. John Gale.
Gault	(Capt.) Andrew	1831 - 35	20	A neighbor (b. 1781) from Bow, N. H. His family was close with the Bakers. He and Mark served as Bow's coroners.
Glidden	C.	1838	2	n/a
Hall	Deac. Jeremiah	1840 - 43	5	A farmer and tanner (b. 1778).
Hannaford	William	1845 - 48	9	Possibly a William T. Hannaford (laborer, b. 1796) or a William S. Haniford.
Hannaford	Samuel	1844 - 47	2	Possibly a Samuel G. Hannaford (farmer, b. 1822).
Hayes	William	1836 - 37	20	A farmer (b. 1796) and neighbor to the Bakers in Sanbornton Bridge, N. H. Members of the Hayes family are mentioned in the Baker family letters.
Hoyt	(Dr.) Enos	1839 - 43	5	A prominent doctor from the adjacent town of Northfield. Along with William Follansby , he gave over one-third of the funds to build the Congregational church in Tilton, which the Bakers attended. Also served in the state legislature.
Jones	William	1841	1	A tin-plate worker (b. 1802), who operated a shop at Tin Corner.
Jones, Esq.	W.	1847	2	n/a

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Ladd	(Dr.) Nathaniel Gould	1836 - 48	41	A prominent physician (b. 1799) and a longtime trustee and supporter of the New Hampshire Conference Seminary, founded in 1845, where Mrs. Eddy occasionally taught in the early 1850s. He is known to have treated Mrs. Eddy during the 1840s during bouts of illness. His son William (b. 1826) later became a senator from Oregon.
Lane	Jeremiah	1836 - 37	4	A farmer (b. 1783). His son of the same name probably lived near Abraham Morrison .
Lang	Lowell	1846	4	A carpenter (b. 1785). At one time lived near Elijah Durgin . He served on the Park Cemetery Association with Mark. Potentially related to Will Lang, a young boy who occasionally visited the Bakers.
Morgan	Trueworthy L.	1831 - 34	9	A resident of Bow, N. H.
Morrill	Moses	1840 - 41	3	A clothier (b. 1810) who purchased the woolens mill from Benjamin Chase .
Morrison	John	1845	6	Possibly John P. Morrison, a carpenter (b. 1787).
Morrison	Abraham	1836 - 37	3	Possibly Abraham L. Morrison, a farmer (b. 1788).
Morrison	Henry S.	1836	2	A carpenter (b. 1789).
Morrison & Hannaford		1842 - 44	3	n/a
Page	Calvin	1848	1	A cabinet maker (b. 1806).
Palmer	Richard	1834 - 35	4	A resident of Bow, N. H., who likely lived near Mark.

Prescott	Sargent C.	1837 - 39	10	n/a
Prescott & Adams		1837	1	n/a
Sanborn	William	1846 - 48	14	n/a
Sanborn	(Capt.) J.	1846 - 48	12	Possibly Capt. Jacob Sanborn.
Sanborn	Dearborn	1844 - 47	4	A blacksmith (b. 1779).
Smith	Benjamin F.	1838 - 45	13	A carriage maker (b. 1808).
Stement?, Jr.	Benjamin	1833 - 35	10	n/a
Tilton	Alexander H.	1841 - 55	35	Mark's son-in-law (b. 1805). He was a successful manufacturer and married Abigail Baker in 1837. Sanbornton Bridge, N. H., was renamed Tilton after his nephew, Charles Tilton. His daughter-in-law married a relative of Elijah Durgin .
Tilton & Baker		1839 - 46	23	The business account for the partnership between Alexander H. Tilton and Mark's son George.
Upton	Hezekiah	1833	3	A resident of Bow, N. H.
White	Pres? S.	1833 - 34	4	n/a
White, Esq.	David	1830 - 33	6	A Justice of the Peace whose signature is found on several legal documents of the Bakers.

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Whitmarsh	(Capt.) Charles	1832 - 35	3	n/a
Wingate	John Cate	1839 - 50	42	A blacksmith (b. 1803). He supported the New Hampshire Conference Seminary, founded in 1845, where Mrs. Eddy occasionally taught in the early 1850s. His wife Eliza was the preceptress of the school when it opened in 1848.
